Musings of a recently retired flyer

I retired last year at the end of August. It is nice to be retired. Some folks at work said they were jealous/envious of me. I still stay in contact with some of the folks from work.

I feel blest/fortunate to be doing this now. I'm just 62 years old, and in reasonably good health. I'm staying busy with a few things:

- Church (I'm an elder now, and help with their IT needs)

- Home maintenance projects (currently replacing wood deck railings with white vinyl)

One of the home maintenance projects I did was cleaning out and organizing my garage space. This took about 2 weeks. Some of the major improvements were:

- Ended up with 4 work areas (2 for storage, and 2 for building new things)
- Added 2 lights over the work areas
- Set up music / stereo for entertainment while I work
- Put in service a large workshop component box (has about 30 drawers)
- Organized screws into labelled containers
- Set up a new Masonite board to hang many tools

While I haven't done a lot of new plane projects with all this improvement, it does help with working thru projects and repairs around the house.

I continue to fly mostly as a sport flyer, although I do have a Piper J-3 in my garage. About 8 years ago, I transitioned out of glow fuel to fly all electrics. This has been a good transition for me. I also have mostly older 72 MHz radios, about half of which are Airtronics, and the other half Futaba. Flying on a budget is my moto. Also, getting flying quickly is another of my goals. Nearly half my planes were obtained from others (and already built), and the other half are ARFs which went together quickly.

Writing and documents have been a big part of my work life, so taking on the club newsletter nearly 19

years ago was a natural to me. And although they call me the Secretary, Nic Burhans does a lot of that work (as much of it goes with being the treasurer). My job over the years has been made easier by many of you who have provided articles and photos. Thanks for the help!

This is a fun club to be in. We have such a diverse group of guys, with so many unique skills, and flying interests. Where else could you find an architect, a CEO of a large car company, air line pilots, artists, communications engineers, power company linemen, military men, IT professionals, and the list goes on.
